WHEREAS, Bell Atlantic Mobile Systems of Allentown, Inc. d/b/a Verizon Wireless (“Verizon Wireless”) proposes to construct and operate a wireless telecommunications facility on property to be licensed from the Village of Johnson City (the “Village”), pursuant to that certain License Agreement between the Village and Verizon Wireless (the “License”), and located in the right-of-way known as Harrison Street, in the Village of Johnson City, County of Broome, State of New York (the “Property”); and

WHEREAS, the facility consists of ground space for a utility pole and communications facility on the Property for the installation of Verizon Wireless’ equipment and associated appurtenances (the “Project”), as more particularly shown on the License Exhibit attached to the License as Exhibit “A”; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board may approve the License pursuant to Village Law §1-102(1); and

WHEREAS, the premises to be licensed to Verizon Wireless are not needed for Village purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board has determined that entering the License is in the best interests of the Village; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board has determined that the rent to be paid by Verizon Wireless is of fair market value; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the License, the Zoning Board of Appeals has conducted a full and comprehensive single agency review of potentially adverse environmental impacts from the Project and the License pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”) and on June 12, 2017 duly issued a Negative Declaration pursuant thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board has reviewed the Project, the License and all other materials submitted in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Village Board met on June 20, 2017 to consider the License.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that:



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1. *The Village Board hereby authorizes the Mayor to execute the License, substantially in the form presented to the Village Board, to allow Verizon Wireless to construct and operate a wireless telecommunications facility and related infrastructure on the Property for an initial term of 5 years with up to 4 additional 5 year renewal terms as described in the License; and for an initial annual rent of \$3,600.00 with 10% increases every 5 years; and for such other terms and conditions as agreed upon by the Village and Verizon Wireless.*
2. *The Village Board finds that entering the License is in the best interest of the Village and surrounding community because, among other things, the Project will provide an essential service to the Village and the public in general and will have no adverse effect on the health, safety or welfare of the public.*

Discussion – Trustee Meaney stated that he is still trying to wrap his head around the length of the agreement being 25 years but understands that after 10 years the Village can renegotiate. Trustee Meaney asked if the rent amount of \$3,600.00/year with a 10% escalation is a normal rate. Daniel Brennan with Nixon Peabody, LLP representing Verizon, explained that yes that is standard start up for the area. It can vary based on the geographic area they are in. Trustee Walker asked if it was correct that after 2 renewals the Village can terminate the agreement. Mr. Brennan stated that is correct. Mayor Deemie explained that this is not a traditional cell tower that people are used to seeing. This will be a pole similar to a telephone pole with a small micro cell tower on it.

JOINT SEWAGE TREATMENT BOARD (Trustees Meaney & King)

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WHEREAS, the Village of Johnson City (the "Village") is a joint owner of the Binghamton-Johnson City Joint Sewage Treatment Facility (the "BJCJSTF") with the City of Binghamton (the "City"); and

WHEREAS, the JSTP is operated and maintained by the Binghamton-Johnson City Joint Sewage Board (the "JSB") under a series of inter-municipal agreements between the Village and the City; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village and the Binghamton City Council approve the budget for operation and maintenance of the BJCJSTF (the "BJCJSTF Budget"); and

WHEREAS, it is advisable to construct improvements at the JSTP for Solids Handling (the "Project") and to proceed with construction of such improvements expeditiously during the current construction season;

WHEREAS, it is beneficial to make modifications to the BJCJSTF Budget pending a bond, bond anticipation note, or other source of permanent funding approved by the City and Village for the Project; and

WHEREAS, the Village intends to finance the Project or portions of the Project with the proceeds of the sale of obligations the interest upon which is excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Johnson City, duly convened in regular session, does hereby resolve as follows:

Section 1. That the Village hereby authorizes and directs the Binghamton-Johnson City Joint Sewage Board Fiscal Officer to amend the 2017 BJCJSTF Budget as follows: (i) create Capital Fund budget line JH8130.554073 (Phase III Remedial Project – Solids Handling Improvements); (ii) create Estimated Revenue budget line J.42770.D (Owner Reimbursements); and (iii) fund and appropriate \$5,200,000.00 to both of the newly-created budget lines.

Section 2. That the costs of construction of the Solids Handling Improvements be paid in due course from the newly-created Capital Fund budget line JH8130.554073 (Solids Handling Improvements).

Section 3. That upon receipt of funds from a bond, bond anticipation note, or other source approved by the Village and the City, the BJCJSTF Budget shall be reimbursed via Estimated Revenue budget line J.42770.D (Owner Reimbursement) for the construction costs expended pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 4. The reasonably expected maximum principal amount of the bond or bond anticipation note to be issued to fund the portion of the Project initially funded by the 2017 BJCJSTF Budget is \$5,200,000. This ordinance is adopted, in part, as official action of the Village in order to comply with Treasury Regulations §1.150-2 and any other regulations of the Internal Revenue Service relating to the qualification for reimbursement of Village and/or BJCJSTF expenditures incurred prior to the date of issue of the bond or bond anticipation note.

Section 5. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the approval of a majority of each of the legislative bodies of the Village and the City.



PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR – VISITORS

Mayor Deemie opened the second privilege of the floor.

Corinna Johnson, Cook Street – Expressed her appreciation for allowing community gardens. Grant Writer Dai Korba explained how the VINES Program works and the first garden will be at Family Enrichment property.

Julie Deemie, Zoa Avenue – Thanked Thomas Sheredy and Sgt. Berdine and his K9 CJ for their years of service. Asked Attorney Jacobs, on behalf of Citizens to Elect Greg Deemie, about a fundraiser event they have planned. She explained that Trustee Balles has some issue with the event and wants it to come before the board. They reserved a pavilion and paid the fee. She asked how it is different from a family reunion or a birthday party. Attorney Jacobs explained that since DPW/Parks took the reservation form he is not sure that it is different from those events. Historically we have not made those types of similar events come before the board. A large event or festival would come before the board. Mrs. Deemie explained that they will be grilling, have a little music, no fees will be charged at the event. Attorney Jacobs explained that if there are questions, the Parks Dept. will reach out to him and they have not. Mrs. Deemie explained that she spoke to Laurie Schultz at length and she thought that Laurie wanted her to reach out to him. Attorney Jacobs stated that he would refer to the Board. Trustee King explained that in 2005 he held a similar event at Northside Park and he filled out the form and paid the fee. He was never spoken to about it. Trustee Walker suggested that they just be sure to follow all of the rules closely. Attorney Jacobs stated that the only thing he remembers was a few years ago when a fund raising event was proposed that involved an inflatable movie screen.

David Kellam, Berkley Street – Asked the Mayor about crossing guards for the Calvary Love's event. Mayor Deemie explained that he informed them that they will need to hire crossing guards. The event has already received board approval. Attorney Jacobs stated that the safety plans usually go through the Parks Dept. Mayor Deemie stated that he will reach out to the church again before the event. Mr. Kellam commented on the DeVincentis trucks going up and down Berkley Street and stated that a Water Dept. employee was nasty to him when he tried to tell him about the big dump trucks parking on Berkley. Mayor Deemie stated that he spoke to the Water Department.

Carol Laskoski, Edward Street – Asked how long has 219 Main Street been vacant. Grant Writer Korba stated approximately 30 years.

Don Slota, Eldridge Avenue – Asked if the Village is replacing hydrants village wide or is this an ongoing thing. Mayor Deemie stated that it is on an as needed basis. Commented on a class he attended recently about solar panels and that it is the State that runs all of that. It is not a local issue. Grant Writer Korba explained what we adopted is the State permit.

Mayor Deemie closed the second privilege of the floor.

VILLAGE OF JOHNSON CITY - LOCAL LAW NO. 5 FOR THE YEAR 2017

A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 5 OF THE VILLAGE CODE ENTITLED APPEARANCE TICKETS

Section 1. Chapter 5 of the Village Code shall hereby be deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

§ 5-1. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this chapter is to authorize public servants, employees and agents of the Village of Johnson City to issue and serve appearance tickets in connection with violations of state statutes, local laws, code violations, ordinances and/or rules and regulations of the Village of Johnson City which the public servants, agents or employees are authorized or required to enforce.

§ 5-2. AUTHORIZATION TO ISSUE APPEARANCE TICKETS.

The following public servants, agents or employees of the Village of Johnson City are hereby authorized to issue and serve appearance tickets with respect to violations of state statutes, local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the Village of Johnson City that such public servants are respectively, required or authorized to enforce:

- A. Code Enforcement Officer: violation of any provision of Part II of the Code (except for violations of Chapter 264, Vehicles and Traffic, Chapter 192, Peace and Good Order, Chapter 92, Alcoholic Beverages), including but not limited to the following:
 - a. Building, including but not limited to the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code.
 - b. Zoning.
 - c. Planning.
 - d. Fire prevention and safety.
 - e. Licensing of occupations or businesses as may be regulated by the Village of Johnson City.
- B. Police Officers:
 - a. Violations relating to public health, safety and welfare, including but not limited to violations of Code Chapter 92, Alcoholic Beverages; violations of Code Chapter 96, Animals; violations of Code Chapter 192, Peace and Good Order; and violations of Code Chapter 240, Streets and Sidewalks.
 - b. Violations of Code Chapter 264, Vehicle and Traffic.
 - c. Violations of Code Chapter 196, Peddling and Soliciting.
- C. Director of Public Services, or any designate thereof:
 - a. Sewage and health violations, including but not limited to the New York State Sanitary Code.

§ 5-3. MANNER OF SERVICE.

An appearance ticket shall be served in accordance with §150.20 and §150.40 of the New York Criminal Procedure Law.

Section 2. Remainder

Except as hereinabove amended, the remainder of the Code of the Village of Johnson City shall remain in full force and effect.



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Section 3. Separability

The provisions of this Local Law are separable and if any provision, clause, sentence, subsection, word or part thereof is held illegal, invalid, unconstitutional, or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, such illegality, invalidity or unconstitutionality, or inapplicability shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions, clauses, sentences, subsections, words, or parts of this local law or their application to other persons or circumstances. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that this local law would have been adopted if such illegal, invalid, or unconstitutional provision, clause, sentence, subsection, word or part had not been included therein, and as if such person or circumstance, to which the local law or part thereof is held inapplicable, had been specifically exempt therefrom.

Section 4. Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with Section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

Recordings of the Village Board meetings and work sessions are available for review through the Village Clerk/Treasurer's Office.
