### **PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR – VISITORS**

Mayor Deemie opened the second privilege of the floor.

*Ron Heebner, Broome County Legislator* – Expressed his delight at seeing Robert Locker join the Fire Department.

*Melodie Smith, Nassau Street* – Asked if the Village will still be putting in the blacktop at the end of her driveway. Mayor Deemie stated yes. Mrs. Smith stated that she is being lied to about several things including the location of her handicapped parking space. Stated that we could put the space any place we want to but she is entitled to park wherever she wants. She said it is easiest where she told us she wants it and we just don't want it there. Mayor Deemie explained the reasons why it needs to go where we determined – if she pulls out of the space the way she described she will be facing the wrong way in traffic. Mrs. Smith continued to argue that she was lied to about the location of the space.

*Julie Deemie, Zoa Avenue* – Regarding resolution #2017-129 - \$6,000 for Fire training travel. Mrs. Deemie asked if there was adequate funds in that line for this. Mayor Deemie stated that if there are not we will have to transfer funds. He would have to look at the budget.

*David Kellam, Berkley Street* – Asked what the SAFER grant was. Mayor Deemie explained that it is Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response and how it works. Mr. Kellam asked about the phases of the reconstruction of New York Avenue. Mayor Deemie explained





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the phases. Mr. Kellam stated that the contractor, DeVincentis, is parking their large equipment on Berkley Street and it is making it difficult for the residents to get in and out of their driveways. Mr. Kellam asked about the proposed handicapped parking space on Nassau Street. Mayor Deemie explained that there is only room for one vehicle. Mr. Kellam asked what is the sense of doing the handicapped space if Mrs. Smith refuses to use it. Mayor Deemie explained that it is a public parking space that anyone with a handicap parking tag could use.

*Janet Brown, Nassau Street* – Stated that Mr. Kellam parks the wrong way and blocks the driveway on Nassau Street when he comes to his property on Nassau Street so he should consider that when complaining about the contractors doing that on Berkley Street.

*Corinna Johnson, Cook Street* – Asked about the SAFER grant. She has only heard about this being used for fire fighters. Can it be used for other emergency personnel. Mayor Deemie explained that it is only for fire fighters. The police have one called a COPS grant. Ms. Johnson reminded everyone about the Cruze Inz and Carousel Day.

Trustee Balles stated that we budgeted \$8,000.00 for the budget line Mrs. Deemie was asking about.

Trustee King stated that the American Legion building was sold and the Legion is raising funds to move the monument in front of their former building to Veterans Park. Estimated cost is \$4,000.00.

Mayor Deemie explained that the Village is not soliciting funds for the monument. Residents can come to the Cruze Inz and visit the Veterans under their tent and learn about this.

*David Kellam, Berkley Street* – Asked what the plans are for the former Legion building. Trustee King and Mayor Deemie explained that the developer's plans are unknown. The building is for sale or lease.

Mayor Deemie closed the second privilege of the floor.

Mayor Deemie adjourned the meeting at 8:13pm.

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### VILLAGE OF JOHNSON CITY - LOCAL LAW NO. 5 FOR THE YEAR 2017

#### A LOCAL LAW AMENDING CHAPTER 5 OF THE VILLAGE CODE ENTITLED APPEARANCE TICKETS

Section 1. Chapter 5 of the Village Code shall hereby be deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

#### **§ 5-1. PURPOSE.**

The purpose of this chapter is to authorize public servants, employees and agents of the Village of Johnson City to issue and serve appearance tickets in connection with violations of state statutes, local laws, code violations, ordinances and/or rules and regulations of the Village of Johnson City which the public servants, agents or employees are authorized or required to enforce.

#### **§ 5-2. AUTHORIZATION TO ISSUE APPEARANCE TICKETS.**

The following public servants, agents or employees of the Village of Johnson City are hereby authorized to issue and serve appearance tickets with respect to violations of state statutes, local laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the Village of Johnson City that such public servants are respectively, required or authorized to enforce:

- A. Code Enforcement Officer: violation of any provision of Part II of the Code (except for violations of Chapter 264, Vehicles and Traffic, Chapter 192, Peace and Good Order, Chapter 92, Alcoholic Beverages), including but not limited to the following:
  - a. Building, including but not limited to the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code.
  - b. Zoning.
  - c. Planning.
  - d. Fire prevention and safety.
  - e. Licensing of occupations or businesses as may be regulated by the Village of Johnson City.
- B. Police Officers:
  - a. Violations relating to public health, safety and welfare, including but not limited to violations of Code Chapter 92, Alcoholic Beverages; violations of Code Chapter 96, Animals; violations of Code Chapter 192, Peace and Good Order; and violations of Code Chapter 240, Streets and Sidewalks.
  - b. Violations of Code Chapter 264, Vehicle and Traffic.
  - c. Violations of Code Chapter 196, Peddling and Soliciting.
- C. Director of Public Services, or any designate thereof:
  - a. Sewage and health violations, including but not limited to the New York State Sanitary Code.

#### **§ 5-3. MANNER OF SERVICE.**

An appearance ticket shall be served in accordance with §150.20 and §150.40 of the New York Criminal Procedure Law.

#### Section 2.     Remainder

Except as hereinabove amended, the remainder of the Code of the Village of Johnson City shall remain in full force and effect.
