PUBLIC HEARINGS

- [1] Local Law Amending Chapter 300 of the Village Code entitled “Zoning” regarding Home Occupations

Mayor Deemie opened the public hearing. There being no one who wished to speak, Mayor Deemie closed the public hearing.

- [2] Local Law Amending the Village Zoning Map for rezone of 400 Riverside Drive

Mayor Deemie opened the public hearing.

Howard Rittburg of Levene, Gouldin & Thompson – appeared on behalf of Adam Weitsman/ Riverside Drive LLC who is the owner of the Davis College campus in regards to the application to change the zoning to Planned Unit Development. Mr. Rittburg stated:

- The property is currently zoned single family. Because the school was chartered under the education law it was permitted in that area. Now that there is no public school there, the permitted use is single family.
- The Planned Unit Development promotes a cohesive use of the property and is a perfect type of zoning. What is there now checks all the boxes for PUD; more than 2 acres, greenspace of over 60%, commercial, retail, residential, recreational uses, post office and it used to have a café and may in the future.
- The Planning Board passed their recommendation for PUD to the Village Board and hopefully the motion will be passed as a PUD.

Lisa King, consultant for Adam Weitsman stated the following:

- It is very important to Adam to maintain the integrity and historical preservation of the campus.

- They anticipate the use being very similar to what it has been.
 - It will be an educational facility for both youth and adults, maintaining the retail, post office and the café.
- The usage at its peak, Davis College had about 300 students, and they are looking at about 150 students on the campus with a more specialized curriculum.
- They are working on the curriculum.
- There have been discussions about basketball or more technology based.
- They are looking at the demands and needs of our universities and colleges in New York State.
- It is important to maintain the integrity, but also create something unique and special to draw students here and also create a pipeline for universities to keep our students in our precious town in upstate New York.

John Solak, Bible School Park - Mr. Weitsman has thrown a lot of things out there, a medical complex, university campus and questions credibility. Will the educational facility be licensed? Mr. Solak asked the Board to proceed with caution.

Mayor Deemie responds they are still in discussion and are trying to figure out what it is going to be.

Richard Vollmer, Riverside Dr – Questioned the address being 400 Riverside Drive.

Attorney Sacco explained the parcels were combined into one parcel at the Davis College Campus, 400 Riverside Drive. The Village Board did refer this to the Planning Board. They recommended approval of the rezoning. This was sent to the Broome County Planning Dept for a 239 Review. The Board did SEQRA downstairs.

Mayor Deemie closed the public hearing.

[3] Local Law Amending Chapter 140 of the Village Code entitled “Electrical Code of the Village of Johnson City”

Mayor Deemie opened the public hearing.

Mayor Deemie explained they are abolishing the electrical board. They have been having a problem trying to get a quorum. They have been working with Binghamton for testing and licensing and that Johnson City will not have a local board.

Mayor Deemie closed the public hearing.

[4] Local Law Amending the Village Zoning Map for rezone of 183 Marie Street

Mayor Deemie opened the public hearing.

Anthony George, Marie St – His house is very visible now from Harry L. Drive and feels this will significantly decrease his property value. It was a quiet street and now his house is almost completely surrounded by businesses. He would like to have them put a privacy fence up. He thinks

it is good for the community but not good for him.

Mayor Deemie confirmed it has to be approved for the rezone before they move forward with site plan. He doesn't see any reason why they can't work with code and Tioga State Bank.

Scott Lance, 19 Crocker – Questioned single family homes near Mr. George and cautioned Checker boarding residential with business.

Mayor Deemie, Mr. George and Mr. Lance discussed the single-family residences and businesses in the area along with the zoning.

Mayor Deemie closed the public hearing.

[5] Public Hearing to consider the adoption of new sewer rents for municipal sewer users in the Village of Johnson City

Mayor Deemie explained what is in the public hearing is an increase in the minimum of \$10 from \$50 to \$60 and an increase on the overage number which is every 100 cu. feet over 1,000 cu. feet would increase by \$2, from \$5.25 to \$7.25.

Mike Tugwell, Greenridge Street – What happened to JSTP privatization?

Mayor Deemie responded that had nothing to do with the property itself and nothing to do with selling it, it was only for the operation and maintenance of the property; running the plant. It was in regards to having a private company come in and run the plant, we would still own it. It is on hold until May.

RESOLUTION OF THE Village of Johnson City

REQUESTING AMENDMENTS TO NEW YORK STATE'S CRIMINAL JUSTICE REFORMS

WHEREAS while there was a need to reform New York’s criminal justice statutes during the 2019 state legislative session, it is widely recognized that several of the drastic changes in the laws pertaining to discovery are overly broad and vague and are having unintended consequences at the municipal level; and

WHEREAS the dramatically shortened time period in which prosecutors must disclose evidence to defendants and the broad expansion of the matters to which such discovery mandates apply will have significant cost, tax and justice implications for cities and villages with police departments, local justice courts or code/parking enforcement departments; and

WHEREAS the discovery reforms mandate prosecutors disclose evidence to the defense within 15 days of arraignment for criminal charges (even if the defendant is not in custody); and

WHEREAS drastically enlarging the scope of material that a prosecutor must review and deliver within 15 days will overwhelm the ability of city and village officials and employees to prosecute cases while managing their misdemeanor and felony caseloads, and will make it impossible to prosecute vehicle and traffic and local code infractions and violations in compliance with the new discovery mandates; and

WHEREAS arraignment must now take place within 20 days of desk appearance ticket issuance, thereby requiring justice courts, many of which convene monthly, to meet more frequently; and

WHEREAS cities and villages will not reap savings from the bail reform's reduction of the burden on county jails; and

WHEREAS municipalities are already challenged with operating within the now-permanent 2% tax cap and have not received an increase in general purpose state aid in 11 years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the *Village of Johnson City* supports the following set of amendments proposed by the New York State Conference of Mayors that are consistent with the intent of the criminal justice reforms but which will allow for more effective and affordable implementation:

- Ensure that cities and villages are provided with additional financial and operational support to offset the cost of these mandated measures;
- Allow 60 days for prosecutors to disclose evidence to the defense for criminal charges;
- Exclude from the accelerated discovery requirements any charge not involving a misdemeanor or felony;
- Adjust the 20-day arraignment requirement to accommodate local courts that meet on a monthly basis;
- Allow prosecutors to withhold sensitive information, such as victim contact information, without having to obtain a court order.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this duly adopted resolution of the *Village of Johnson City* be forwarded to Governor Andrew Cuomo, Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins, Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie, Senator *Fred Akshar* and Assembly Member *Donna Lupardo*, the New York State Conference of Mayors, and local media outlets.

Discussion: Trustee Reynolds stated he asked the board to make an amendment to the title and they refused. He didn't want it to be overly broad when this resolution is only dealing with discovery.
